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Discussion Questions

- 1. What did you find most helpful or most challenging from this class?
- 2. After hearing the teaching, do you think faith in the God of the Bible is reasonable and rational? What concerns do you still have that make it difficult sometimes to believe in the God of the Bible?
- 3. If the Trinitarian God of the Bible really is the One, True God, what does that mean for your life? What are the implications? What should change about your thinking/ behavior?

Weekly Devotions

Over the course of the next three weeks, complete the devotions listed below by reading the assigned Scripture, answering the questions that follow, and praying in line with what you learned. Each devotion should take no more than 15 minutes. Consider using the **ReadScripture** app to assist you.

(The questions are based on the English Standard Version of the Bible)

Week 1: Read Psalm 19:1-3

- 1. The psalms are, by their very nature, poetic and often utilize metaphors and figures of speech. The heavens and the skies do not literally and audibly "declare" or "proclaim" things. What then is this Psalm telling us about the heavens/sky? What purpose do they accomplish?
- 2. According to this psalm, who (or how many people) hear this "speech" of the heavens/sky?
- 3. What does this teach you about God (Father, Son, and Spirit)?
- 4. What does this teach you about yourself (sinful attitudes/behaviors to confess and repent of, a need that you have, a way in which you need to grow/change, etc.)
- 5. Using what you learned, spend 5 minutes in prayer 1) adoring God for who He is, 2) thanking Him for what He's done, 3) depending on what you learned about yourself, asking Him for assistance, forgiveness, strength, etc., 4) and praising God for the assurance and love you have through the Gospel.

Week 2: Read Hebrews 1:1-3

- 1. According to the wording of verse 2, are "these last days" a time period still in the future or a time period that has already started?
- 2. How has God most clearly spoken to or revealed Himself to us right now?
- 3. What do verses 2-3 teach us about the Son of God (Jesus)? Does this description sound like Jesus is a being equal to or lesser than God?
- 4. What does this teach you about God (Father, Son, and Spirit)?
- 5. What does this teach you about yourself (sinful attitudes/behaviors to confess and repent of, a need that you have, a way in which you need to grow/change, etc.)
- 6. Using what you learned, spend 5 minutes in prayer 1) adoring God for who He is, 2) thanking Him for what He's done, 3) depending on what you learned about yourself, asking Him for assistance, forgiveness, strength, etc., 4) and praising God for the assurance and love you have through the Gospel.

Week 3: Read Galatians 4:4-7

- 1. Where do you see each person of the Trinity in these verses? What is the role that each person plays?
- 2. According to these verses, what did the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit work together to accomplish for us? Who are we before receiving this work of the Triune God and who are we after we receive it?
- 3. What does this teach you about God (Father, Son, and Spirit)?
- 4. What does this teach you about yourself (sinful attitudes/behaviors to confess and repent of, a need that you have, a way in which you need to grow/change, etc.)
- 5. Using what you learned, spend 5 minutes in prayer 1) adoring God for who He is, 2) thanking Him for what He's done, 3) depending on what you learned about yourself, asking Him for assistance, forgiveness, strength, etc., 4) and praising God for the assurance and love you have through the Gospel.
